It turns out that the pride and joy of the museum is one of only three Fokker DII's in the world that still has its original covering. The Brome County Historical Society is indeed fortunate to have in its possession a Fokker D VII which is believed to be one of three planes of that type in the world with its original fadoric One of the most frequently asked questions by visitors to the museum is "How did you get #?"

Our Fokker D VII was one of twenty-two D VII's sent to Canada as War Trophes. It was dispatched to Canada from Faitham, England, on March 12, 1919. The arplanes were stored of Camp Borden, Ontario According to some records, German Aircraft were sent to McGill University, Mount Allison University, Acadia University, University of Manitoba, University of Saskatchewan. University of Alberta and to the Brome County Historical Society At least seven of the swenty-two D VII's were loaned to a company formed by Mai. William A. (Billy! Bishop and Lt. Col. W. George (Bill) Barker which tourest the country giving air shows using these arplianes. The place as our possession appears to be the only one which survived.

On November 27, 1918, any sisteen days after the signing of the Armistice. Senator George G. Faster wrote to Col A.G. Doughly, Dominion Archevist, asking J some war trightes could be sent to Knowton. Senator Foster wrote to Col. Doughly, on June 2, 1920 thanking him for the offer of an aligname for the Brome County Historical Museum and stating that orders for the erection of a building to house the airplane had been given. Senator Foster, a former student of Knowton Academy, contacted another former student, Zeiktes E. Martin, who paid for the erection of the annew to the Paul Holland Knowton Museum, in which the airplane would be ritiphayed. Senator Foster had a son, George Buchanan Foster, who was an officer in the Royal Flying Corps during the war, and LE Royal Flying Corps et the USA during the war. The lives of their sons were spared.

Our Fokker D VII (FOK D VII (ALB) 681078) was shipped from Camp Borden, Angus, Ontano, on May 27, 1920 to Knowlton at a cost \$112.50.

Senator Foster write a letter to Col. Doughty on November 5, 1920, in which he alated that the building to house the airplane was completed, the arplane had been placed in the building, and that the Museum was waiting for conneceen to put 8 logether. On May 5, 1921 Senator Foster again write a letter to Col. Doughty saying that a permanent floor was being installed and that within a month or was being installed and that within a month or init in mechanic would be revealed to properly initial the airplane, as July 1, 1921 was the proposed official opening of the miceasan when the summer pocple would be present. Senator Foster wrote to Col. Doughty on June 15, 1921, again stating that the museum was waiting for someone to set up the ampione and that the other packages of war triphies would not be unpacked until the ampiane had been set up. Senator Foster was still foping that the building would be officially opened early in July.

The Martin Annex was officially opened by the Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Borden on August 26, 1921. Col Doughty was on hand at the official opening and had arranged displays in the museum.

Rev E.M. Taylor, in his capacity of Secretary of the Society, sent Col. Doughty a letter on December 29, 1921, thanking heir Kr.*. The great service he has rendered to the Country, especially our County and Museum...*

Because of the furnisists and generosity of men like Senator Foster and Zelotes Martin, our D VII has been preserved for present and future generations to admire and for the Brome County Historical Society to become known throughout the workd.
